* Two poverty stricken mother's and babies, with our maternity and baby programme.

* A 17yr old girl eventually diagnosed with Appendicitis, she had many trips to a Raipur Hospital. She is on our referral programme

* May '10: An 18yr old boy taken 7 hours away to city hospital, which saved his leg from amputation; he'd been bitten by a cow, it had become gangrenous after 2 years. Dec '11 his leg flared up again so Vijay took him to a Specialist Bone Hospital in Maharashtra State, then a City Hospital in Raipur.

* A Patient with brain malaria raced 100kms to another hospital in our FMS ambulance for expert treatment he survived.

* There was a fairly severe Flood in August/September our Hospital and school are built on high ground and were not affected.

We are very proud and pleased with all our Bengali/Indian Managers, Staff and Volunteers who put so much work and commitment and love into 'their' whole project. The area has blossomed for the villagers, it has become a really inspirational shared project with three very diverse cultures working together and speaking each others languages Bengali, Adivaashi, and Hindi and English. The Local Government have promised to build a newly created bridge across the river adjacent to our project. This means more access for patients and our FMS Ambulance. We also have 50 more tribal Children's names down at the school. 50%are girls! Our teachers(following in the footsteps of our multi talented Vice Head Teacher Pubali who died of Brain malaria in September 2009) offer after school classes to women and our pupils. More Patient's come to the Clinic 'in time' now as they seek our Doctor's help before it becomes an emergency; the ambulance is used more and more. Primary Health Care is improving lives. Our project is sustainable because of the funding from F.M.S. We TTT Charity raise monies with the help of Standing Orders {thanks to you all} and fund's raised by our trustees and Friend's of The Tulsi Trust.
